President Kenyatta pays tribute to Wangari Maathai as he leads the nation in marking World Environment Day

has urged to emulate Kenyatta Kenyans late Maathai Professor passion achievements conservation environment.

The President said it is the conservation efforts of great Kenyans like the late Nobel Laureate that the country remains one of the most biodiverse nations in the world.

He said Kenya is proud to have made great strides towards sustainable development, restoration and preservation of its biodiversity and challenged Kenyans to ensure that the heritage they have is protected bequeathed to future

generations as a gift.
"It is in recognition of these riches that drove the Nobel Laureate, Professor Wangari Maathai, to celebrate environment and dedicate herself to protecting it. We must emulate Wangari's example, and show by our stewardship that we too are worthy heirs," the President

The Head of State spoke today at the Nairobi Arboretum where he led government and private sector representatives in a tree planting exercise to commemorate this year's World Environment Day.

During the event, the sident also witnessed President the ground-breaking for the development of a borehole that will assist in the setting up of a one million tree nursery in the

World Environment Day is observed on 5th of June every year and has been celebrated for the last 45 years. It is the United Nations' flagship day for promoting worldwide awareness and action for the environment.

President Kenyatta said the government is fully committed to the conservation agenda and listed a number of ongoing initiatives among them the restoration of Michuki Park, the



expansion of Nairobi National Park and the reclamation of grabbed forest land.

He said the Government is working overtime to expand green areas across the country.

"We are also reclaiming our Ngong Forest and we are going to start the process of fencing it and ensuring that it is also available not only for present but for future generations.

"We have done in the last one month another 2,000 acres for Nairobi National Park and this is what we want to continue doing including restoration of various green areas among them rehabilitation of City Park," the President said.

He underscored the key role forests play as a reservoir of biodiversity saying Kenya

on course to achieving the 10 percent national tree cover

As parts of the Government's conservation agenda, the President said all major infrastructure projects including the Standard Gauge Railway are being implemented in a manner that ensures that biodiversity is not tampered

"As a Government, we have also taken steps to ensure that infrastructure projects g implemented, which are a key driver of economic growth, do not cause any degradation to our natural habitats and biodiversity," President Kenyatta said.

He said the Government continues to expand the number and size of conservancies, arboreta, parks and wildlife reserves so as to ensure the country's botanical

and zoological diversity is maintained.

The President called for closer cooperation between government entities, the private sector and local communities saying such collaborations have enabled Kenya to register a fall in wildlife poaching incidents, illegal logging and human-wildlife conflicts.

Commending on the conservation projects being undertaken in Nairobi County, the President urged Governor Mike Sonko to work very closely with the Nairobi Metropolitan Service team led by Major General Mohamed Badi so as to ensure quick turnaround of the interventions.


Environment Cabinet Secretary Keriako Tobiko was represented by his Principal Secretary Dr Chris Kiptoo at the event that was attended by among others Nairobi Governor Mike Sonko, European Union Ambassador Simion Mordue, British High Commissioner Jane Marriott and the Ambassador of Finland Eric Lindberg.

Also present were Safaricom CEO Nicolas Ng'ang'a, Nairobi Metropolitan Services Director General Mohamed Badi and the Chairman of Nairobi Arboretum Community Forest Association Brian Waruhiu.

In his remarks, EU envoy Simion Mordue said through the European Union Investment Bank, Kenya has been allocated 300 million Euros as an emergency response package to assist in the fight against Covid-19.

Safaricom CEO said his organization has partnered with the Kenya Forest Service in an initiative that will see the two institutions plant five million trees in the next five years.

During the period of turmoil the mental instability of the person seeks to talk to someone about their insecurities going through their mind. President Kenyatta welcomes Kenya's UN **Security Council elections victory** of the country's growing profile

Kenyatta has welcomed Kenya's resounding in today's victory second round of voting in the elections for a non-permanent seat on the UN Security

The President has termed Kenya's win as a demonstration and influence in the community of nations as a steadfast and dependable development

The Head of State thanked Kenya's competitor in the election, the Republic of Djibouti for being a worthwhile opponent and the African Union for the endorsement as the continent's flag bearer in

the contest. Kenya, the President said, will endeavor to consolidate and voice Africa's position in the Security Council and will advance its 10-point agenda as outlined during the campaign





resident Uhuru Kenyatta today said it was time for Kenya to come up with new economic and political visions to prepare the nation for the great leap forward.

Likening Kenya's situation to references in the Bible, the President said independent Kenya is in its 50s, and the holy book required nations to hit the reset button every 50 years. He said the actions, which

He said the actions, which the people called "the Year of Jubilee" brought renewal to the soul; healing to the land and a fresh vision to its people.

The Head of State spoke at State House, Nairobi where he led the nation in marking the 57th Madaraka Day. The event was initially scheduled to be held in Kisumu but because of travel restrictions put in place to control the spread of Covid-19, it was held in Nairobi.

on politics, the President regretted the divisive nature of Kenyan politics and pitched for the recalibration of the country's political architecture.

"If we have done great things in the area of brick and mortar, the greater things that remain to be done have to do with our governance system," the President said.

The Head of State advised Kenyans not to fear changing the country's political system saying it doesnt serve present and future purposes.

"We cannot re-imagine our nationhood without changing our political architecture. And we cannot change this architecture without reengineering our constitution," the President said.

He said his ambition is to improve on the Constitution and "get right what we got wrong in 2010."

He said: "The constitutional moment I discern is one that will bring an end to the senseless cycles of violence we have experienced in every election since 1992".

Besides politics, the President said Kenya also



needs a transformation of its civic culture.

"If we are to push the re-set button and re-imagine our dreams as a nation, we must transform our civic culture to one that is biased towards duty, hard work and integrity."

On the economy, President Kenyatta said his administration has made admirable progress towards the realisation of Vision 2030 through the implementation of the Big Four Agenda.

He noted that Vision 2030 comes to an end in 9 years and said that there is a real urgency for a new vision and a new dream.

Citing his administration's investments in infrastructure, reforms in education, technical training, expansion of electric connections and improved healthcare, President said his administration's transformative agenda was inspired by the collective dreams of Kenya's founding fathers.

"My administration has built 1,000 kilometres of tarmacked roads every year. This is 44 times more than what the colonial administration built, and more than 4 times what the first three administrations built collectively per year," the President recollected.

President Kenyatta also spoke on the development and expansion of ports as gateways to regional and international market

With the construction of the new Lamu port and the revival of Kisumu port underway, he said the government will keep investing in transformative infrastructure projects.

infrastructure projects.
Alongside the Standard Gauge Railway which already runs between Mombasa and Naivasha, the President said his administration is overseeing the revival of the old railway

lines.

"Apart from the SGR, I am reviving the defunct Nairobi-Nanyuki railway line, traversing six counties. The rehabilitation of the Naivasha to Malaba metre gauge line is also about to commence".

The President said the Government continues to carry out reforms in the country's education sector especially in technical and vocational training so as to reposition the nation's human resource for the dynamic world economy.

the dynamic world economy.

The Head of State also spoke in detail on the huge improvements electricity distribution saying in his Sevens years at the top, 3.5 million new households have been connected to electricity compared to 4.5 million households recorded from the time of colonialism to 2013.

"This means that we have done 15 times more than the previous administrations, to connect our people to electricity," the President said in the televised ceremony also addressed by Deputy President Dr William Ruto and Mr Wycliffe Oparanya, the Council of Governors Chairperson who is also the Kakamega County Governor.

On health, the President said his administration is fast tracking the roll out of the universal health coverage programme noting that every county now boasts of modern medical equipment.

medical equipment.

Speaking briefly on the Covid-19 containment measures currently in place, the President said the government is consulting with religious leaders and stakeholders in the education sector on the way forward.

DP Ruto said the Covid-19 pandemic has taken a big toll on Kenyans and has altered lifestyles.

He noted that with schools closed, places of worship shut and many losing sources of income, life has been turned upside down for many.

The DP called on every Kenyan to support the measures instituted by the government to mitigate against the effects of Covid-19.

Governor Oparanya commended the President for his frontline role in the fight against Covid-19 saying the national government has continued to provide resources needed by counties to deal with the pandemic.

Tourism to reopen next month, CS Balala says



ourism and Wildlife Cabinet Secretary Najib Balala has hinted that the the hospitality sector could open next month after adoption of the globally recommended World Tourism and Travel Council Covid-19 mitigation protocols.

Balala said the sector has suffered from the pandemic with over 90 per cent of its earnings having been lost since March.

He said the sector generates Sh. 170 billion annual revenue to the government which has all been lost.

The CS said plans are in top gear for reopening the industry.

"We are working with the World Tourism and Travel Council to get the stamp or certification that our protocols are compliant internationally," he said.

Balala was speaking in Watamu Kilifi county after releasing a fully recovered sea turtle during the World Sea Turtle day, a tour of the Watamu Marine Association plastic recycling centre and the Bio Ken Snake farm in the resort town.

The CS said job losses in the industry were also overwhelming but expressed optimism that the situation would return to normal soon

would return to normal soon.
"The country's GDP depends
on tourism and that's the sector
that was hard hit by Covid-19
but also globally we have lost
over 120 million jobs from this
pandemic and over 400 billion
dollars in terms of revenue," he

Globally, Balala said 90 per cent of international travel has been halted due to the virus.

However, he said the domestic market could recover fast before international travel

following the restrictions imposed in some countries. "Am optimistic that in one

"Am optimistic that in one year, we can work hard in the domestic market but the stakeholders in the tourism industry must appreciate that the domestic market has a different taste and they are sensitive to prices," he said.

sensitive to prices," he said. He said hotels must do more to attract local tourists.

The CS the pandemic has evidently shown that tourism is not about travel but everyone in the value chain including farmers, snake parks and all other businesses that depend on the sector for survival.

A look at Watamu for

A look at Watamu for example which is a renown international tourism destination he said all hotels are closed because the sector is dead.

"It's a lesson to open up to the domestic market, we need to change our mindset. We need to appreciate the domestic market is valuable, it has been valuable even before," he added.

He added: "Kenya is lucky to have a strong domestic market as other countries have only been relying on the international market and now they are suffering because it will take time for renowned destinations in Kenya and Africa to open up the International market."

He said South Africa has announced opening of international travel in 2021 while parts of Europe are saying they will not allow their citizens to travel out of Europe until 2021.

"So these are the challenges that we will have and realistically speaking the aviation industry needs to start operating so that the tourism industry is successful," he said.



DENTAL HEALTH: Halitosis

Halitosis is an oral health problem where the main symptom is bad smelling breath. Halitosis is a latin word which is derived from 'halitus' which is 'breathed air' and 'osis' which means 'pathological alteration'. The undesirable condition is a common complaint for both genders and for all age groups.

Causes of bad breath

There are many causes of bad breath. Some of the causes are: Certain foods

Food items such as onions and garlic causes bad breath. Brushing and rinsing with a mouthwash briefly masks the odor.

Poor oral hygiene Irregular and improper brushing and flossing techniques may leave food particles in the mouth. These tend to be a breeding ground for bacteria and can cause an unpleasant odor.

Improper cleaning of dentures

Dentures that are not cleaned

correctly may collect bacteria, fungi and food particles which in turn leads to bad breath.

Periodontal (gums/ gingiva) disease

Inflammation of the gums and accumulation of tartar causes a foul odor and taste in

Dry mouth

It is also known as xerostomia and occurs when there is decreased salivary production subsequently leading to inadequate cleansing of the mouth and removal of debris which in turn leads to the bad breath.

Tobacco products

Cigarettes, cigars and other tobacco products puts the body at risk for a host of diseases in addition to the unpleasant mouth odor it causes. Tobacco products wreak havoc on your body and your breath.

Medical conditions Certain conditions such as respiratory infections, diabetes, gastrointestinal disorders or a



liver or kidney disorders can all cause an oral malodor. Certain types of cancer can also cause halitosis.

Treatment and prevention

It is important to identify the cause of the bad breath and treat it accordingly. This can improve

significantly. malodor the Certain healthy foods such as carrots and apples may improve salivary production. Sugar free chewing gum also increases salivary production. Good oral hygiene measures will improve the bad breath.

People interact with each other every day and halitosis has a negative effect on the person's social life. It can cause significant psychological distress therefore a visit to an oral health professional may aid in identifying the cause of the foul odor and can be treated

successfully.

Mombasa marks day of African child with pledge to protect minors

enya marked the Day of the African Child with renewed pledge to strengthen protection of minors amid rise in cases of physical abuse, neglect and forced labor during the Covid-19 pandemic period.

Mombasa Children coordinator Philip Nzenge said the county government is committed to improving the welfare of children in line with constitutional obligations, even as social ills continue to take a toll on the vulnerable generation.

The official, while delivering a keynote speech during the restricted celebrations held at Uhuru na Kazi building said the county has developed a 'Mtoto kwa Mtoto' campaign within vulnerable areas to sensitize children on their rights

"Access to child friendly justice systems is key in ensuring child protection. In Mombasa, we are still grappling with rise in teenage pregnancy, juvenile criminals and that is why we have developed this programe," he said.

Mishi Omar, 15 a pupil at Marimari primary School is among 15 other community volunteer children who have developed the passion to sensitize other children against ills in the society. Mishi who is steering the programme at Mwakirunge area says her passion to sensitize girls came after one of her close friends was impregnated and dropped out of school.

"I saw my friend undergoing a lot of pain because the person who impregnated her walked scot free while her friend was struggling with the pregnancy with the only support from her parents," she said.

"My mother has been

"My mother has been supporting me in my efforts to teach other girls how to take care of themselves and how they can get justice in an event they are sexually assaulted," said Mishi.

Born in a family of 12, Mishi is the daughter of Mapenzi Charo,



her single mother who lost her husband a few years ago. Mishi who is currently in primary school says her ambition is to pass all her exams and become a child rights advocate.

"Many of the girls in Mwakirunge ward are still subjected to early marriages and teenage pregnancy, others lack sanitary towels, this made me join the campaign to sensitize my fellow children," added Mishi.

According to Lucy Sindani, Senior resident magistrate at the Tononoka children court, since the Covid-19 struck the country, about 240 cases were recorded under certificates of agency at the court alone.

"Since the corona virus pandemic, we used to receive about 80 cases per month, you can calculate for three months, but out of the cases about 30 of them have received rulings," said Sindani.

The nature of the cases range from sexual assault, criminal cases and violence related cases. Likoni and Kisauni sub-counties are leading with increased cases on violation of children rights.

The official however said case backlog has remained a nightmare to the realization of child rights. So far, the courts are handling cases dating back to 2016.

In Kenya, there are only two special courts that handle child cases. This courts are located in big towns therefore making those in rural areas vulnerable.


"Our fear is that many cases have also gone unreported and

have been solved within family circles, we discourage that because children end up suffering a lot," she added.

She cited lack of resources and lack of legal representation in courts as a stumbling block to finding justice for the majority of children who are unable to express themselves in court room.

"We have limited facilities like this time of Covid-19, the children are kept in police stations and this risks their life even more," said Sindani.

Over fifty children assaulted in Mombasa County during covid period children department reveals



e further noted that Kisauni, Mwakirunge, Utange and Vikwatani are the most affected areas.

"As we celebrate the day of the African child, we must observe their rights so that we do not harm them. It is true that cases of sexual violence and child neglect have shot up during this period," Nzenge said. He also lamented on an increase in online assault against children.

The director urged parents to be responsible of their children.

He says constitutionally children are protected against online and sexual violence.

According to him, Mvita subcounty leads in an increase of street families while likoni Subcounty leads in high numbers of sexual violence against children.

At the same time Nyali subcounty children's department officer Biberone Umazi urged parents to play their parental obligations.

She pointed out that children in Kidogo basi and Mkunguni areas are the most affected lot.

" Most children from rich families in Nyali are assaulted online while cases of defilement and child neglect is rampant amongst poor families", she said.

Watamu residents benefit from selling trash

onservationists in Watamu area of Kilifi county have launched a waste management programme that will see them buy garbage collected from the beaches so as to help conserve the Ocean during the Covid-19 pandemic period.

The program dubbed trash for cash which is being supported by Kenya Wildlife Services (KWS) and other conservation groups is being managed by Watamu Marine Association (WMA)

It aims at supporting locals who have lost their source of livelihood due to the impact of coronavirus.

Watamu entirely depends on the tourism sector and about 99 percent of the workers in the sector have lost their jobs after hotels were shut down in March.

Conservationists spoke during the World Oceans day cleanup exercise in Watamu which was



graced by the Coastal Marine and Freshwater Management programs in the National Environmental Management Authority (NEMA) Stephen Katua. Karen Njue, the WMA assistant

Karen Njue, the WMA assistant project coordinator said the Trash for Cash project was initiated to support the community by buying waste collected from the beaches.

Speaking at Turtle bay beach, Njue said the project has been made possible by donors around the world.

She warned that plastic waste was becoming a serious pollution menace in the Coast marine environment.

In May, she said they managed to support 471 people who collected 8.5 tonnes of plastics and marine litter in Watamu.

''During this time, we call it a period of kusi and kaskazi period

or low season whereby a lot of marine litter is washed up in Watamu beaches so during this period from May to August there is a lot of marine litter in our beaches in Watamu," she said.

Njue said the majority of waste collected from the beach included hard plastic pieces fitting size of 10 to 100 centimeters, bottles, and bottle tops.

Watamu Marine National Park Warden Dadley Tsingayiu, said the Trash for Cash program which is going on has been able to raise Sh. 0.5 million to help in cleaning the beaches and ensure the locals remain engaged.

He said most residents depend on tourism and therefore closure of hotels has had an adverse effect on them

on them.

The Warden said the crime rate in the area has gone up and exploitation of marine resources such as fishing in protected areas

has begun to rise due to the COVID 19 pandemic.

"Logging of mangrove is also on the rise, we organized with the local community to provide something small for their survival such that as we try to fight the pandemic they are able to clean the beaches and get paid," he said.

Tsingayiu said the locals go to the beach to collect trash which is weighed by WMA and they get paid to help buy food for their families

Matilda Mathia said collecting trash in the beaches has given her

hope again.
"In the beach, there are turtles and fish. If they eat the trash like plastic or ropes its life will be endangered," she said.

For her, she said Corona virus is a blessing in disguise as she is still able to earn money to feed her family, unlike many others who






